FROM THE PRESIDENT

Progress continues to be made on the building maintenance and improvement agenda. Not visible, but important have been the changes and repairs to the electrical system which have been completed and will improve both service and safety. On the visible side I would like to encourage all members to attend the upcoming membership meeting on October 25th or otherwise stop by the museum to see the completed new front steps and sidewalk.

At its meeting on September 8, 2014, the Board approved a resolution requesting the members to amend the Bylaws at the upcoming membership meeting. Enclosed with this letter is a copy of the proposed amendments, together with a marked copy indicating the proposed changes. Basically, the proposed amendments will do away with the right of businesses and other service organizations to vote and designate a person to serve on the Board of Directors in return for paying a higher dues amount. The right is being retained for governmental bodies (currently the City of Oconomowoc and the Oconomowoc Area School District). No businesses are currently using this provision and we believe it best to remove this appearance of "selling" board seats. We do hope to foster a closer relationship with the business community by encouraging their employees to become members as well as the business itself.

In addition, the proposed changes to the Bylaws places authority to set all dues with the Board rather than also requiring a vote by the membership at the October meeting.

LOCAL HISTORY COMMITTEE



Here's a challenge to test your knowledge of Oconomowoc pioneers. Read the brief biography and try to guess the identity---answers follow.

Sandie Carter, Local History Committee Chair

- 1. I was born in 1828 in New York City, New York and died in 1913. I worked as a teacher in Chicago and other cities from 1848 to 1858. I taught in Oconomowoc at the Episcopal Seminary for Young Women, later known as Bord du Lac Seminary, from 1858 to 1889. I was held in high esteem as a gifted teacher who was cherished by her pupils long after they left school. I worked with Julia Lapham to create a public library here in Oconomowoc.
- 2. I was born in 1814 in Uxbridge, Massachusetts and died in 1885. I was married twice (Caroline Watson and Caroline Calkins) and had four children. I moved to Oconomowoc in 1861 I converted a hardware store into a hotel that had access to Lac La Belle. The hotel that bore my name was very successful and attracted many wealthy guests. I served as the city's mayor for two terms and was revered as one of the most enterprising and public-spirited citizens.
- 3. I was born in 1863 in Hamilton, Ontario and died in 1950. My husband Charles and I and had four children. My husband died in 1910, leaving me a fortune. I was the owner of several Chicago theaters. I purchased the Jones House Hotel which I renamed the Majestic Hotel, a home in the area, and the Draper Hotel. Fire destroyed the Draper Hotel in 1927; a smaller building was constructed and was sold in 1931. I was a member on the boards of the New York Metropolitan Museum of Art, Chicago Art Institute, and Three Arts Club. Sadly, I lost my money during the depression, but I was named Oconomowoc's Outstanding Citizen in 1937. My husband and I are buried at the highest point in the cemetery.
- 4. I was born in 1856 in Hanover, Germany and died in 1932. I was married to Elizabeth Theobald and had one child. I immigrated to the Waukesha area in 1861 as a child. I was the mason/architect for mansions in the Oconomowoc area (Bullen, Armour, Depee, Petit, Pabst, and Peck). I was mayor from 1924 to 1930.
- 5. I was born in 1828 in Augusta, New York and died in 1885. I was married to Lenora Close. I was a hardware merchant in St. Louis and opened a store in Oconomowoc in 1861. I built a summer home in Oconomowoc with gaslights and hot/cold running water. I bottled the spring water on my land and called it La Belle Spring Water.
- 6. I was born in 1846 in Milwaukee and died in 1936. I was married to a doctor. I was the daughter of Martin Thayer Draper. I spent summers in Oconomowoc following my husband's death in 1890. I was the manager of the Three Arts Club in Chicago and wrote *Oconomowoc Yesteryears* in 1929.
- 7. I was born in 1840 in Germany and died in 1924. I was married twice (Sarah Schneider and Bertha Meyer) and had many children. I moved to Oconomowoc in the mid-1860s and purchased a tannery on Fowler Lake. Later I opened a brewery on the tannery site. I was one of the founders of the First National Bank and served as president and vice-president. I was known as a highly respected businessman in Oconomowoc and in the state. My monument is the tallest in the cemetery.
- 8. I was born in 1858 in Pewaukee, Wisconsin and died in 1947. I was married to Charles. I was a student at Bord du lac Seminary and studied voice and music in Paris, Vienna, and Leipzig. I was considered a musical prodigy and was active in the local theater guild. I was president of the Oconomowoc Music Club, a Red Cross volunteer (I knitted over 1,000 sweaters), and president of the local League of Women Voters. I was the half-sister to Hugo Lorleberg, who ran a local hardware store.

- 9. I was born in Prussia in 1847 and died in 1892. I moved to America as a young child and grew up in Waukesha County, where my parents were farmers. I served in the Union Army in the Civil War I opened a hardware store in Oconomowoc in 1870. I rebuilt the store after a fire in 1879. I was the proprietor of a local iron foundry, machine shop, and waterworks. Following my death from typhoid fever, my sisters took over the business.
- 10. I was born in 1855 in New York City, New York and died in1910. I was married to Caroline Lewis, and had four children. I worked for the famous circus magnate, P. T. Barnum. I was a major promoter of dime museums and vaudeville. I became a millionaire investing in nickelodeons and owned several Chicago theaters. I was the director of the Western Vaudeville Managers' Association, president of Orpheum Circuit, representative and chairman of the executive committee of United Booking Offices, and president of Kohl and Castle Amusement Co. I built Brier Cottage, a 45-room summer home, which hosted Calamity Jane, Harry Houdini, Lillie Langtry, Will Rogers, and Lillian Russell. My wife and I are buried at the highest point in the cemetery.
- 11. I was born in 1846 in Canada and died in 1908. I was married to Mary Lenore Nixon and had four sons. I was in the malt business in Kenosha and Chicago. I purchased land on Oconomowoc Lake and built a castle, modeled after Hever Castle in England. Included on the grounds were a gardener's house, coach house, water tower, and greenhouses powered by electricity. I donated money to the Oconomowoc Library and was the chairman of the Good Roads Committee. I promoted a canal connecting Fowler Lake to Lac La Belle.
- 12. I was born in 1832 in Barwalde, Germany and died in 1910. I was married to Louise Suddow and had three children. I moved to Oconomowoc in 1868, where I worked as a blacksmith.
- 13. I was born in 1820 in Boston, Massachusetts and died in 1897. I was married to Eliza Ann Whittemore, and we had two children. I was an agent for the law firm of E. M. and A. W. Randall and was appointed aide-de-camp as a colonel under Governor Randall. I purchased 125 acres on the north shore of Oconomowoc Lake, and built my home, which had 75 rooms (50 bedrooms). It became a hotel in 1874. After my death, my son managed the hotel, which was unfortunately sold in a sheriff's sale in 1909 and burned down in 1912

ARCHIVAL COMMITTEE

We have received donations from:

- Sue Van den Berg and sisters from the Counsell, Cole, and Spear families a large collection of family histories dating back to the 1700s in England! Several large portraits were included, one of Gilbert Counsell, another of him and his family on his wedding day to Asa Milo, and several other family portraits. The family genealogy was also included. Gilbert Counsell had a farm on the northeast corner of the Town of Oconomowoc in the 1800s. More farms owned by the family were located In the Town of Merton. It is a very large family. Many lived in different parts of Wisconsin, and a few members moved to other states.
- ✓ Dorothy St. Thomas some high school students' water colors of "The Depot," "City Hall," and "The Freight Depot." These were painted circa 1980s and had been part of a collection in the St Thomas home.
- Cathleen Morris a large collection of Presidential memorabilia from all the presidents of the U.S. This collection, belonging to her and her mother, has now been entrusted to us, including a diorama with small statutes of the U.S presidents and one of George Washington on the Potomac River. This will enhance the presidential campaign button collection which Dorothy St. Thomas donated. The Exhibits Committee may explore possibilities for a Presidential Exhibit in the near future.
- Carol Lamm collections of "Raggedy Ann" books and grammar school reader books and several vintage hand craft booklets on crocheting and tatting. The booklets partner well with vintage clothing in exhibits. It is interesting to compare how children learned from the early school texts and what elementary school children learn from today. Some of these bygone books can be seen in the school room exhibit.
- Trish Kwitek -- "Star Wars" LP album cover with a photo of Darth Vader, Beatles LP album cover, and several other LPs. Unfortunately, the records were damaged or missing, but the covers are historic for their time and represent the era of Sci-Fi movies and young group performers of the 80s.
- ✓ The Model Railroad volunteers have donated so many items it would take a page just to list them. Thank you so much for the railroad cars, engines, tracks, model buildings, and landscaping items, as well as the numerous hours of labor and construction!
- The OAHS&M also thanks Gordon and Susan Telford for their generous monetary contributions to help defray the cost of the railroad expansion and for their special gift of \$1300 to fund the mural, painted by Ken Reichert, which will soon include a memorial plaque for their son, Andy. The Telfords also donated a diorama of "Look! There's Emerald City," which Gordon and Andy created and which will be a touching addition to the museum's Wizard of Oz collection.


Forest Leaf Establishes First Ford Garage in Oconomowoc

Born in 1882, Forest Leaf, son of Wingate and Julia Leaf, grew up on a farm in the town of Summit. As a young man, Forest lived and worked in Milwaukee at the International Harvester Milwaukee Works factory. Returning to Oconomowoc after a few short years, he opened his own business, Leaf's Garage, in 1905, located on South Main Street in a building owned by his father.

This building currently houses the Wisconsin Fencing Academy.

First selling REO automobiles, but switching to Fords in 1909, Leaf built a very successful car business.

With the need for more space and his father Wingate's death in 1914, Forest soon sold the garage building and moved to 163 E. Milwaukee St. (E. Wisconsin Ave.) in the rear of the Hintz Bakery. Forest's son, Robert Leaf, made the following observation of this new location: "It had an alley entrance south off of Milwaukee St. While the alley was narrow, it permitted Model T platform, solid rubber rear wheeled trucks to enter. Such were used in hauling milk to the Carnation Milk Company in milk cans." Homestead lighting now occupies this space.

It wasn't long before Forest moved once again to what was then

called the Motor Inn Garage at 205 S. Main St. This location was situated almost across the street from his first location. This building offered show room space and a good-sized repair area in the back. This building now houses Catherine's Class Act Beauty Salon in the front and Aasen Heating and Cooling in the rear.



All the while Leaf's Garage was moving from place to place, Forest was planning to erect a brand new building with a showroom, offices, parts department, repair garage, and used car sales area. In the fall of 1917, he moved into this space at 306 S. Main St., across the street from the St. Jerome's Catholic Church parish house. Forest Leaf operated his Ford dealership out of this site for 21 years. Because of failing health, Leaf gave up his dealership in 1938, and he died three years later in January 1941.

Harold Hornburg owned a Ford dealership in Hartland and was looking to expand his business, and so, in 1941, he purchased the Ford dealership in Oconomowoc. The original location for his showroom and repair shop was located just to the west of the city beach band shell at 324 W. Wisconsin Ave. He shared the building with J.P. Birdener, who operated a marine repair business.

Hornburg Ford was a well-known dealership along Lac La Belle for twenty five years; in 1966 the owners built a much larger and more



modern facility at 1000 Summit Ave. After another 20 years in business, Hornburg sold to the Safro dealership, who continue to sell Fords to this day.
