

<p>Peter Binzel Sr. <i>Section E, Lot 125</i></p>	<p>Born: Jan 11, 1840 in Selzen, Germany Died: Dec 31, 1924 Married: Sarah Schneider (1847-1901) and Bertha Meyer (1863-1917) Children: Phillip, Peter Jr., Ida, Anna, 4 children preceded him in death Tallest monument in the cemetery</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Immigrated to Waupun (1862), then Beaver Dam (1864), then Oconomowoc • Purchased a tannery on Fowler Lake • Opened brewery (Binzel Brewery) on site of tannery • One of the founders of the First National Bank – served as president and vice-president • Known as a highly respected businessman in Oconomowoc and the State
<p>George Bullen <i>Section 2, Lot 24</i></p>	<p>Born: 1846 in Canada Died: Sep 11, 1908 Married: Mary Lenore Nixon (1861-1919) Children: George Jr., Richard, William, John</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Was in the malt business in Kenosha and Chicago • Built “Bullen Castle” (modeled after Hever Castle in England) on Oconomowoc Lake – included gardener’s house, coach house, water tower, greenhouses, electricity • Donated money to the Oconomowoc Library • Member of the Oconomowoc Lake Club • Chairman of the Good Roads Committee • Promoted a canal connecting Fowler/ and Lac LaBelle lakes
<p>Martin Thayer Draper <i>Section E, Lot 7</i></p>	<p>Born: Aug 22, 1814 in Uxbridge, MA Died: Jan 15, 1885 Married: Caroline Watson (1827-1842) and Caroline Calkins (1825-1894) Children: Caroline Watson (Edward and Cornelia), Caroline Calkins (Charles and Mary)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Milwaukee (1844), then Portage (until 1860), then Oconomowoc (1861) • Purchased property in Oconomowoc (1869) • Converted a hardware store into a hotel, <i>Draper Hotel</i>, that had access to Lake La Belle – the hotel was very successful and attracted wealthy guests • Mayor (1876-1878) and (1880-1881) • Revered as one of the most enterprising and public spirited citizens
<p>Mary Faville nee Draper <i>Section E, Lot 7</i></p>	<p>Born: Sept 9, 1846 in Milwaukee, WI Died: Jul 18, 1936 Married: Dr. Henry Faville (1822-1890)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Daughter of Martin Thayer Draper (1814-1885) • Spent summers in Oconomowoc following her husband’s death in 1890 • Manager of the Three Arts Club in Chicago • Wrote <u>Oconomowoc Yesteryears</u> (1929)
<p>Louis J. Flotow <i>Section 2, Lot 3</i></p>	<p>Born: Feb 4, 1856 in Hanover, Germany Died: Jul 18, 1932 Married: Elizabeth Theobald (1873-1953) Child: Bona Dea</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Emigrated to Waukesha (1861) • Mason/architect for mansions in the Oconomowoc area (Bullen Castle, Armour, Dupee, Petit, Pabst, Peck) • Mayor (1924-1930)
<p>James C. Hitchcock <i>Section E, Lot 591</i></p>	<p>Born: 1828 in Augusta, NY Died: May 28, 1885 Married: Lenora E. Close (1829-1903)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hardware merchant in St. Louis, who opened a store in Oconomowoc (1861) • Built a summer home in Oconomowoc with gas lights and hot/cold running water • Bottled the spring water on his land (LaBelle Spring Water)
<p>Grace Phoebe Jones <i>Section E, Lot 243</i></p>	<p>Born: Jan 20, 1828 in New York City, NY Died: Jan 18, 1913</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Taught in Chicago and other cities (1848-1858) • Taught in Oconomowoc at the Episcopal Seminary for Young Women (later known as Bord du Lac Seminary) (1858-1889) • Held in high esteem as a gifted teacher, who was cherished by her pupils long after they left school • Worked with Julia Lapham to create a public library



<p>Molly Kartak nee Maurer <i>Section E, Lot 2</i></p>	<p>Born: May 5, 1858 in Pewaukee, WI Died: Mar 3, 1947 Married: Charles Kartak (1860-1901)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Student at Bord du lac Seminary and studied voice and music in Paris, Vienna, and Leipzig • Musical prodigy and active in the local theater guild • President of the Oconomowoc Music Club • Red Cross volunteer – knitted over 1,000 sweaters • President of the local League of Women Voters • Half-sister to Hugo Lorleberg, who ran a local hardware store
<p>Caroline Kohl nee Lewis (see Charles Kohl) <i>Section E, Lot 273 Mausoleum</i></p>	<p>Born: Jul 29, 1863 in Hamilton, Ontario Died: Dec 25, 1950 Married: Charles Kohl (1855-1910) Children: Charles, Jr., John, Caroline, Dorothy</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Husband died in 1910, leaving her with a fortune • Became owner of several Chicago theaters • Purchased the Jones House Hotel in Oconomowoc and renamed it Majestic Hotel • Purchased a home and the Draper Hotel • Fire destroyed the top floor of Draper Hotel in 1927, most of the building survived and was sold in 1931 • Member of the board of New York Metropolitan Museum of Art, Chicago Art Institute, and 3 Arts Club • Lost her money during the depression • Named Oconomowoc’s Outstanding Citizen (1937)
<p>Charles Edward Kohl (see Caroline Kohl) <i>Section E, Lot 273 Mausoleum</i></p>	<p>Born: 1855 in New York City, NY Died: Nov 12, 1910 Married: Caroline Lewis (1863-1950) Children: Charles, Jr., John, Caroline, Dorothy Highest point in the cemetery</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Worked for the famous circus magnate, P. T. Barnum • Became a major promoter of dime museums and vaudeville • Became a millionaire investing in nickelodeons • Director of the Western Vaudeville Managers’ Association • President of Orpheum circuit • Representative and chairman of the executive committee of United Booking Offices • President of Kohl and Castle Amusement Co. • Built Briar/Brier Cottage, a 45-room summer home in Oconomowoc, which hosted Calamity Jane, Harry Houdini, Lillie Langtry, Will Rogers, and Lillian Russell
<p>Hugo Lorleberg <i>Section E, Lot 3</i></p>	<p>Born: Feb 25, 1847 in Prussia Died: Oct 22, 1892</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Waukesha County as a young child • Parents were farmers • Served in the Union Army in the Civil War • Opened a hardware store in Mukwonago, and then Oconomowoc (1870) • Rebuilt the hardware store after a fire (1879) • Proprietor of local iron foundry, machine shop, and waterworks • Following his death of typhoid fever, his sisters took over the business
<p>Gustav Machus Sr. <i>Section E, Lot 119</i></p>	<p>Born: 1832 in Barwalde, Germany Died: Sept 9, 1910 Married: Louise Suddow (1830-1896) Children: Gustav Jr., Mathelda, Frank</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Oconomowoc (1868) • Blacksmith



<p>Dr. Daniel McLaren Miller <i>Section E, Lot 255</i></p>	<p>Born: May 19, 1836 in New York, NY Died: Apr 25, 1912 Married: Mary G. Remington (1835-1913) Children: Nathaniel, Jennie, Charles, Thomas</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Received medical degree in Vermont • Moved to Oconomowoc (1858) to set up practice • Served as a Union Army physician during the Civil War • Continued his medical practice out of his home after the war
<p>Douglas Gideon Munger <i>Section D, Lot 6</i></p>	<p>Born: Oct 8, 1839 in Oswego, New York Died: Dec 23, 1899 Married: Mary/Ruth Fanner, Mary Brooksby (1838-1895) Children: Mabel, Lydia, Van Curan</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Well-known local photographer, who used the latest developments in photography • Photographs highlight the early history of Oconomowoc
<p>Carl August Nathusius <i>Section 2</i></p>	<p>Born: Jan 27, 1830 in Silesia, Prussia Died: Apr 20, 1921 Married: Louisa Dammasch (1832-1917) Children: Minna, Anna, William, Caroline</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Wagon maker, who lived in Milwaukee, Woodland, and Beaver Dam for many years • Moved to Oconomowoc (1887) and opened a saloon • Purchased Oconomowoc House Hotel, which was destroyed by fire in 1898 • Built another saloon (1902) and opened a grocery store

Notbohm <i>Section D, Lot 16</i></p>	<p>Born: May 6, 1837 in Germany Died: Jun 19, 1918 Married: Magdalene "Lena" Vinz (1844-1915) Children: Edward, Henry, Frank, William, Emma</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Oconomowoc (1875) • Owned and operated a furniture store and undertaking business • Alderman, Mayor (1885-1886), postmaster
<p>Julius Rhodex <i>Section 2 Ext., Lot 5</i></p>	<p>Born: Apr 23, 1840 in Germany Died: Apr 24, 1923 Married: Fredericka Rusch (1844-1920) Children: William, John, August, Ida, Anna, Julius, Mary, Emma</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hired from Germany to be a gardener for the Schuttlers of Pine Terrace
<p>Henry Howey Shufeldt <i>Section 2 Lot 28 Mausoleum</i></p>	<p>Born: Mar 30, 1834 in Red Hook, NY Died: Nov 13, 1906 Married: Emeline Egan (1838-1922) Children: William, Emeline, Mary</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Traveled the world as a sailor • Wealthy Chicago distiller of whiskey, and after the Chicago fire (1871) bottled spring water • Built summer mansion on Lac La Belle, called the Anchorage • Had a short lived business bottling spring water in Oconomowoc, until someone punctured the pipe • Built a 9-hole golf course on his property and invested in the Oconomowoc Country Club
<p>William Peterson Tweeden (born Ole Peterson) <i>Section 2, Lot 28</i></p>	<p>Born: 1849 in Stone Bank, WI Died: Feb 5, 1905 Married: Josephine B. Forre (1853-1931) Children: Melvin, Edna, Cora, Olga, Florence, Effie</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Thought there were too many Petersons, so based new name on Norwegian ancestors – Tveiten) • In the dredging business – established much of the Oconomowoc Lake shoreline and widened the channel between Fowler and Oconomowoc lakes • Constructed an artificial island on Oconomowoc Lake for Phillip Armour, Jr. • Children and grandchildren were very influential business and civic leaders in the Okauchee area



<p>May Elizabeth Armour Valentine nee Lester <i>Section 2, Lot 67</i></p>	<p>Born: Sep 7, 1869 in Chicago, IL Died: Feb 3, 1965 Married: Philip Danforth Armour Jr. (1869-1900) and Patrick Anderson Valentine (1861-1916) Children: Philip – Philip III, Lester, Patrick – Patrick Jr.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Danforth Lodge, a summer mansion on Oconomowoc Lake, was a wedding gift from Philip Armour Sr. – the house had 50 rooms (including 18 master bedrooms), European gardens, and a small zoo • After the death of Philip, May married Patrick Valentine, an employee of the Armour meat packing plant • May’s second husband, Patrick, helped form the Oconomowoc Lake Club and was the first commodore. He donated to Oconomowoc’s early baseball league and provided funds to the city for street work.
<p>Dr. John Henry Voje <i>Section J, Lot 5</i></p>	<p>Born: Mar 12, 1853 in Germany Died: Jul 21, 1927 Married: Johanna Henrietta Ulrich (1862-1932) Children: Hertha, John Jr.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hired by Philip Armour Sr. (1888) to run Waldheim Sanitarium (later called Summit Hospital), which offered holistic method of the treatment of chronic and nervous diseases • Considered to be the “Wizard of Waldheim” • Johanna was a member of the State Historical Society
<p>William August Wegener <i>Section E, Lot 225</i></p>	<p>Born: Dec 6, 1867 Oconomowoc, WI Died: Jun 25, 1966 Married: Lila Allen Lyons (1871-1936) Children: Lila had children from a previous marriage</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Played the cornet and sang opera at an early age – considered to be a musical child prodigy • Took voice lessons at the Royal Academy of Arts in Berlin, Germany • Sang over 300 operas throughout the United States and Europe • Sang opera at New York’s Metropolitan Opera • Taught voice and chorus at Marquette University
<p>George L. Wilsey <i>Section E, Mausoleum</i></p>	<p>Born: May 13, 1851 in Columbia Cty, NY Died: Nov 15, 1906 Married: Martha Proseus (1856-1954)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Oconomowoc with his family as a child • Started working for a local merchant, Elijah Parsons • Started a business with C. L. Kellogg called Wilsey and Kellogg • Headed his own dry goods, carpet, and clothing store called George L. Wilsey and Company • Served as vice president of the First National Bank
