<p>Washington Wallace Collins Section E, Lot 97</p>	<p>Born: Aug 22, 1822 in Craftsbury, VT Died: Mar 8, 1902 Married: Julia Ann Campbell (1824-1899) Children: Sumner, Wallace, William, Julia, Solomon, Nellie, Charles</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Oconomowoc (1840s) • First mayor (1875-1876) and again (1878-1879) • First official postmaster • First agent for railroad companies during the westward expansion from Milw. to La Crosse • Served as local railroad agent for over 50 years
<p>Henry Kirk Edgerton Section C, Lot 57</p>	<p>Born: Apr 3, 1820 in Coventry, CT Died: Sep 27, 1908 Married: Sarah Ann Loomis (1827-1915) Children: Henry, Martha, Leslie, Benjamin</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved west from New York (1840) • Secretary to WI governor, Governor Farwell • Opened Summit Bank • President of Cemetery Association for 40 years • Mayor (1881-1882) • Managed a award winning farm
<p>George Pardon Gifford, Sr. Section E, Lot 188 (small marker, initials only)</p>	<p>Born: Mar 4, 1820 in Boston, MA Died: Feb 9, 1897 Married: Eliza Whittemore (1831-1897) Children: George, Jr., Ann</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Purchased 125 acres on north shore of Oconomowoc Lake • Agent for the law firm of E. M. & A. W. Randall • Appointed aide-de-camp as a colonel under Governor Randall • His home, "Villa Gifford," had 75 rooms (50 bedrooms) and later became <i>Gifford Hotel</i> (1874)
<p>David Hastings Section D, Lot 86</p>	<p>Born: Nov 4, 1812 in Amherst, MA Died: Jun 16, 1903 Married: Mary Sprague (1808-1894) Children: Olive, Lucius, William, Martha, Harriman, Henry, Sarah, Weber, Ann Eliza, Horace</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Wisconsin (1840) • Cabinet maker and shoemaker • Farmed in the Oconomowoc area • Sons, William and Henry, died in the battle at Shiloh in the Civil War
<p>Janette Hinkley nee Townsend Section E, Lot 8</p>	<p>Born: Mar, 1832 in Attica, NY Died: Jan 22, 1871 Married: Benjamin Hinkley (1809-1892)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • One of first teachers in Oconomowoc area (1846) • Husband was a prominent resident of Summit • Brother, Hosea B. Townsend, was one of Oconomowoc's first doctors

Hurlbut Section E, Lot 1088</p>	<p>Born: Oct 10, 1817 in Newtown, CT Died: Nov 28, 1905 Married: Catherine Chandler (1818-1864), Mary Hills (1825-1917), Margaret Sperling (1858-1942) Children: Catherine (Julia, Patrick, Henrietta, Kate), Margaret (Edwina and Margie)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Wisconsin (1850) • Prominent attorney, politician, and journalist • Elected Waukesha Cty District Attorney (1856) • Commissioned a colonel to serve on Governor Randall's staff during the Civil War • Owned & published the Oconomowoc newspaper - <i>Free Press</i> • Assisted in formation of the Republican Party



<p>Curtis Mann Section A Lot 3</p>	<p>Born: Jun 22, 1815 in Hartford, NY Died: Mar 8, 1894 Married: Nancy Comstock (1825-1906) Children: Fanny, Frank, William, Orville</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Built three story mansion on Oconomowoc Lake • Opened a private bank (1870) • Built a building in downtown Oconomowoc for stores, social gatherings, meetings, and plays • Member of the Milw. Board of Trade (1858-1875) • Elected Wisconsin State Senator (1868) representing Waukesha County • One of the wealthiest residents in Waukesha County, but later declared bankruptcy and forced to sell his mansion
<p>John Starr Rockwell Section 2</p>	<p>Born: Mar 25, 1810 in Butternuts, NY Died: Feb 3, 1863 Married: Lavinia Hard (1818-1852) and Anna Bradley (1827-1915) Children: Lavinia (Albert, Franklin, Eva, Ella, Hobart), Anna (Cora, Adelia, William)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Considered the "Father of Oconomowoc" • Played a significant role in government, politics, education, business, industry, and religion • Donated property to local churches • Organized and financed major road construction of Milwaukee to Watertown Plank Road and Mayville to Fond du Lac Plank Road • Brought the railroad to Oconomowoc (1854) • First president of the Oconomowoc Cemetery Association
<p>Charles Bowen Sheldon Section E, Lot 42</p>	<p>Born: Feb 3, 1812 in Gouverneur, NY Died: Jun 3, 1891 Married: Lucinda Cotton (1825-1857) and Sarah (Rix) Brown (1832-1908) Children: Lucinda (Nancy, Albert, Anna Marie), Sarah (Elizabeth, Charles) Charles is probably buried with Lucinda, but there is no headstone for him. Sarah is buried in Spokane, WA</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First settler in Oconomowoc (1837) • Claimed 160 acres on Fowler Lake (includes current cemetery land) • Tricked into traveling to Washington, D.C. to obtain a permit for a dam - while gone, John Rockwell built a dam which flooded much of Sheldon's land • Farmed his land for 50 years
<p>Judge David Wilson Small Section E, Lot 249</p>	<p>Born: Dec 28, 1826 in Frankfort, PA Died: Oct 25, 1899 Married: Susannah Ely (1828-1906) Children: George, Flora, Eva</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Oconomowoc (1850), where he practiced law • Waukesha County District Attorney (1862-1869) • Elected Circuit Court Judge (1869-1881) • Started first newspaper, <i>Oconomowoc Free Press</i> • One of the first six stockholders of Oconomowoc's first bank • Expanded his home on Lac La Belle into a hotel, <i>Woodlands</i>, which accommodated 100 guests
<p>Conrad Van Curen Section A, Lot 2</p>	<p>Born: Sep 11, 1809 in Nassau, NY Died: Dec 28, 1888 Married: Catherine Righter (1808-1898) Only hillside crypt in cemetery</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Moved to Wisconsin (1845), returned to NY (1848), settled in Oconomowoc (1851) • Property acquired through marriage enabled him make investments and amass a fortune • Following Conrad's death, Catherine lived with her niece & husband, Mr. and Mrs. D. G. Munger
